Honouring Excellence: A New Year Tribute to Exceptional Reporters!



Advanced Maternal Age Study Update

As you will know, we finished active reporting and data collection for the Advanced Maternal Age Study on 1st February 2024. This means that **there is not much time left to catch up with reporting and data entry!** We will be starting new studies in 2024 so we now need one last push to complete this study.

So far, 172 units (91%) have submitted at least one report and 66% of units who have reported cases have completed data entry. If you have data to enter and are waiting for your OpenClinica login details, please contact Alessandra at ukmidss@npeu.ox.ac.uk. She will give you access to the database. If you have **reported cases in error**, please let Alessandra know so that she can delete those cases from the database and stop chasing you.



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
Units we need your reports!

We are really looking forward to meeting you in person at our UKMidSS Study Day in Birmingham on 11th March. Spaces are filling up quickly for our exciting programme which includes updates and results from UKMidSS studies, as well as from other high-profile national studies with an impact on midwifery practice. As well as the UKMidSS team, other speakers include Jenny Cunningham and Jude Field, Research Advisors at the RCM; Claire Litchfield, Consultant Midwife from Oxford University Hospitals NHS Trust; and Julia Sanders, Professor of Clinical Nursing & Midwifery at Cardiff University.



We know it can be tough to get time out of work at the moment, but this is a unique opportunity to meet and learn from other birth centre midwives from across the UK, hear about nationally relevant research, and return refreshed and inspired! We're also planning interactive sessions and drop-in advice about developing your own research ideas and projects, so get your thinking caps on. What are the questions or issues that are puzzling you in practice and you can't find the answer for? No question or issue is too small, too trivial or too difficult. We'll have experts on hand to help you think about research question design, research methods, patient and public involvement and much more!

RCM's Research Prioritisation Project – Your voice matters



Jenny and Jude, Research Advisors at the RCM present the Prioritisation project below:

We have just launched a big national project, which we hope will influence the future of midwifery and maternity research. We are working with an organisation called the **James Lind Alliance** (JLA) to find the top 10 priorities for midwifery practice and maternity care research. We want to hear from midwives, midwifery students, maternity support workers as well as women and birthing people, together with their families, friends and supporters. Together we will work to build a consensus of what the priorities will be, and we will be following the JLA method to do this. This work is needed as

midwifery practice and maternity care research is not well funded compared to other areas of healthcare. The RCM feels it is vital that we push midwifery and maternity research up the agenda, which will ultimately mean better care for women, their babies and families.

We have a Review Group of three UK professors - Professors Helen Cheyne, Vanora Hundley and Julia Sanders - who advise us and ensure academic rigour. We also have a strong Steering Group of 17 individuals which consists of midwives, MSWs, a midwifery student and women and representatives of service user organisations. This group, together with our JLA advisor, ensures that the project has the right focus and follows a systematic and accountable process. Our survey went live on Monday 7 January 2024 and is open until midnight on Sunday 7 April - link is **here**. We want as many midwives as possible to respond to the survey and have their say. We know that the UKMidSS network of midwives is in a particularly informed group of professionals. You work in clinical practice but are also involved in data collection and have knowledge of current midwifery studies. The areas you might suggest as research priorities do not have to be clinically focused, they can address issues such as for education and learning, workforce issues, management and research. Anything of relevance to midwives as defined by the Nursing and Midwifery Council **Standards of Proficiency for Midwives** is relevant to this project.
